






















EYFS, volcanologist visit, maths, phonics, poetry books, playing, juice and biscuits with Miss Redman...just a few of the memories we've made this week.






Remember that Monday is a bank holiday to allow the country to remember and celebrate the life of Queen Elizabeth II.

Our PCSO and Bradford's traffic team have been out and about on Market Street this week.
