

That is our job and our main priority, and so it is pleasing to know that 44% of responses, 'strongly agree' with this. Another 54%, 'agree' with this.




54% of responses, 'strongly agree' that they would recommend Steeton Primary to another parent.



It is good to see that the vast majority of our children enjoy coming to school. From your responses, we can see that a very small number of children may not be enjoying school at this time, and we can take steps to improve this.

The most concerning response was regarding the information you receive about your child's progress. 12% of responses, 'disagree' with this. We will be getting in touch to see what we can do to improve this.



I have had several parents ask about the potential union action strike day on 28th February. Whilst I do understand that it is frustrating, it is very difficult to be able to give an answer at this stage as to whether or not school will be open. I am looking to open school – if possible – for a limited number of children. However, given the limitations that accompany such action, I am not sure that it will be possible. If a decision *is* made to open, this is also subject to change on the 28th, as staff are not obligated to tell me their intentions until the morning of the strike.

I have spoken to or met with several parents and residents of School and Market Street this week who are worried about the parking at the end of the school day. The pavements are narrow and usually have wheelie bins on them, which leaves little room for pedestrians - especially those with prams.

Many parents arrive in good time and park responsibly on the main road (or side roads that are not for permit holders only). Many parents choose to park on Market or School Street. This is fine, but please can I ask *on behalf of our children* that you park without mounting the kerb, do not double-park and ensure that you leave room for children to pass safely on the pavements without having to walk in the road. Please do not park on the double yellow lines by the car park at the bottom of Market Street, nor undertake dangerous manoeuvres that can put children's safety at risk, such as a 3-point turn.

It is frustrating that there is absolutely nothing that school can do to improve the situation. However, if we work together positively, we can improve things for our children. One small thing we have managed to change is the timing of the traffic lights which, when changed, should assist in the movement of traffic around school and also result in less condensed emissions.

Please note that children will no longer be able to use the main door via the office as a thoroughfare after the half term break. They will need to enter school through the cloakroom doors. This is a particular issue for children that are late. Unfortunately, we seem to live in an area of constant roadworks – and roadworks that change location from one day to the next. This is not an excuse for lateness. Every endeavour needs to be made to get children to school in good time to start at 8:45am.

I hope that you and your families enjoy a well-earned rest from school over the coming week. We look forward to seeing the children back on Monday 20th February with gates open from 8:30am.
