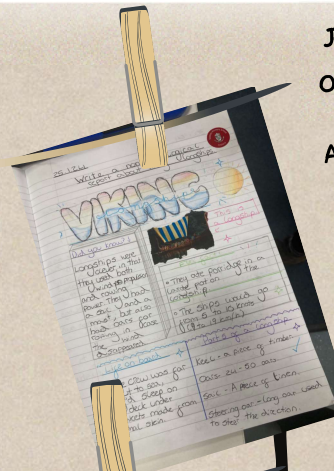
## Our adventures at Steeton Primary School this week...

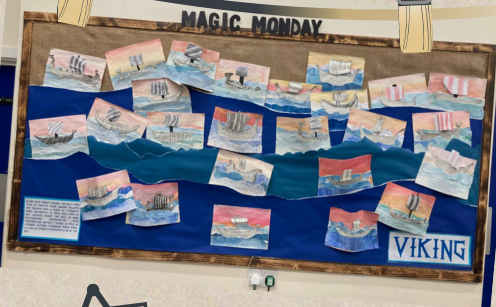

## REMINDERS

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- Footwear needs to be suitable for play and exercise. Plain black trainers are great for wearing everyday. Slip on shoes, furry boots and heels are not good for running around in. Please do not send children in bright coloured, fancy branded trainers.
- Water bottles - these need to be brought every day and taken home to wash and re-fill. Water only - no juice.
- No jewellery to be worn at school. Earrings should be studs only; hoops are dangerous.
- Technology does need to be brought into school. We provide what is needed. This includes smart watches. They are distracting and can get lost or broken. Any technology with a camera should not be brought into school for safeguarding reasons.
- Medicine needs to be handed to Miss Kershaw at the beginning of the day.
