


Our adventures at Steeton Primary School this week ...



We also have lots of stories and books in school about feelings; when you read about other people's feelings then you can learn how it makes them feel.

Online Safety

This week, we were without the internet for a couple of days. It made us realise how dependent we are on technology and allowed us to pause and reflect on how important it is to keep our children safe online.

In today's digital age, our children are growing up surrounded by technology. It is an intrinsic part of their everyday life. But they are not necessarily mature enough to handle everything that is out there online.

At school, online safety is taught and practised. We have school security filters and also those set for us by Bradford - children are pretty safe online at school. However, we do also know that children are super-smart when it comes to technology and we all have to be on our toes to continue to protect them.

At home, your child may be safe in their room, or even on the sofa next to you...but do you REALLY know what they are doing on their device? Don't be afraid to check!

Make sure your child only accept ANY requests from people you know in real life. Never a friend-of-afriend or a stranger.

What is Social Media?
Online spaces where people can interact. Examples include Facebook, Instagram, TikTok, Snapchat, and Twitter.
However, your child can interact using Roblox etc too.

BE THE BOSS
